The lights and decorations have gotten bigger and brighter throughout the years, but one thing remains the same – the warm, fuzzy feeling you get when you set eyes on the glittering beauty. After the official lighting ceremony on November 30, the tree will be illuminated daily from 6 a.m. to midnight. And on Christmas Day, the lights will be switched on for 24 hours.

Carnegie Hall

Founded in 1891, this concert venue and National Historic Landmark is one of the most prestigious stages in the world. Take a tour to hear behind-the-scenes tales of visiting musical legends. Over the years, it's hosted the likes of Leonard Bernstein, The Beatles and Billie Holiday.



Central Park

As the most-visited urban park in the United States, New York City's iconic 843-acre green lung is essential to its identity. Enjoy a leisurely stroll along its leafy paths — exquisite when the autumn foliage reaches its colorful peak — or rent a rowboat and explore the lake.



The Museum of Modern Art

Lake Tahoe One City, Five Ways

Adventure is always around the corner in this outdoor playground

With North America's largest alpine lake, hundreds of miles of scenic trails, some of the best skiing in the world and around 300 days of sunshine each year, it's no wonder Lake Tahoe — which straddles the border between California and Nevada — is a haven for outdoor fun in every season. But there's something that makes fall and winter extra magical in this slice of paradise, whether you're admiring the cascading snow while indulging in a lobster dinner or ice skating against a backdrop of white peaks and verdant forests. Here's our pick of some of the best things to see and do in the Jewel of the Sierra.




Get in the winter spirit with ice skating in Lake Taho

Nature

Skiing aside, there's plenty of outdoor adventures in Lake Tahoe this time of year. Grab your snowshoes and head to Shirley Canyon for a <u>guided tour</u> of icy waterfalls and creeks. And for a glimpse of the bald and golden eagles that rest here during the colder months, trek to <u>Chickadee Ridge</u>.

While Lake Tahoe itself doesn't freeze over, the surrounding towns have become popular ice-skating destinations. Practice your double axel at Heavenly Village in South Lake Tahoe or the Resort at Squaw Creek in Olympic Valley. Meanwhile, thrill-seekers can try their hand at snowmobiling. Book a group or private tour with Lake Tahoe Adventures, which transports guests through mountain meadows to peaks nearly 8,500 feet above sea level.

If you're simply looking for jaw-dropping views, take the 2.4-mile ride up the <u>Heavenly Gondola</u> before stopping at one of Lake Tahoe's most picturesque observation decks for glorious panoramas of the sparkling waters below.

Arts and Culture

Lake Tahoe naturally appeals to more outdoorsy types, but if you know where to look, the area is also full of fascinating cultural sites. Follow in Mark Twain's footsteps as you tour some of his favorite spots, including a section of the Flume Trail, where the views are what he extols as "the fairest picture the whole earth affords."

North of the lake, near Tahoe National Forest, you can find an ancient Native American petroglyph site — sacred inscriptions on the mountains' rocky surface. Visit nearby <u>Donner Memorial State Park</u> and learn about the American pioneers who once traveled to this part of the Sierra in wagon trains, and the dangers they faced on their journeys.

The region also has a number of impressive museums and historic homes. These include <u>Vikingsholm</u>, considered to be one of the finest examples of Scandinavian architecture in the country, and <u>Gatekeeper's Museum</u> in Tahoe City, where you can see the largest Native American basket collection in the Lake Tahoe Basin.

Food

Many of Lake Tahoe's restaurants specialize in seafood dishes and hearty meats sourced from local farms and ranches — perfect for fueling your action-packed adventures. But they have something else in common, too: stunning waterfront vistas. For arguably the best table in town, make a reservation at Edgewood Restaurant, where floor-to-ceiling windows look out on the lake and mountains. Ask the host for the best time to book, so you can enjoy creative dishes such as pine-cone-smoked elk loin and espresso-dusted veal chop during sunset.

Another excellent establishment with a gorgeous view is <u>Riva Grill</u>, which serves Dungeness crab sandwiches and lobster deviled eggs on its heated patio. Then there's also <u>Artemis Lakefront Cafe</u>, which offers a twist on classic Greek dishes – think beer-battered mahi-mahi slathered with a tangy remoulade and served in a pita wrap.

If you're looking to quench your thirst after a day on the slopes or the trails, check out Lake Tahoe's booming craft-beer scene. South Lake Brewing Company and Lake Tahoe AleWorX are two popular hangouts, and South of North Brewing Co. sets up fire pits for those who prefer to drink alfresco. And for bites and drinks served with lakeside patio views, grab a table at Bear Moon Bar and Grill at Hilton Vacation Club Lake Tahoe Resort.

Shopping

Despite its small-town vibe, Lake Tahoe is packed with charming galleries and boutiques selling goods from talented local artisans. Stop by <u>GaiaLicious</u> – something of a South Shore creative incubator – for made-in-Tahoe treasures, such as gemstone jewelry from designer <u>Melissa Gisele</u> and small-batch clay mugs by <u>Sierra Clay Art</u>. At <u>Heavenly Village</u>, you'll find <u>Pacific Crest Gallery</u>, which curates art, rustic home decor and jewelry, as well as <u>The Eadington Gallery</u>. The latter is home to the works of Michael Eadington, a fine-art landscape photographer born and raised in the Sierra Nevada region.

Up in Tahoe City, you can visit independently-owned shops at the Bavarian-inspired <u>Cobblestone Center</u>. These include <u>Tipsy</u>. <u>Gypsy</u> for women's clothing, <u>Pineapple</u> for home decor and <u>Trunk Show</u> for a rotating selection of art, jewelry and woodwork.

Nightlife


Though the North Shore tends to be a bit sleepy, South Lake Tahoe has earned a reputation as a thriving nightlife destination in these parts. If you're looking to treat yourself, <u>Cliché Lounge</u> has an extensive menu of premium whiskeys and vintage wines, as well as 50 brands of cigars. Locals enjoy hanging out at <u>Whiskey Dick's Saloon</u>, a beloved dive bar with darts, classic video games and, on most weekends, live music courtesy of alternative, rock and bluegrass bands.

Further north, Tahoe City boasts a more laid-back but lively nightlife scene. Pete 'n Peter's has been a local institution for over four decades, while the nearby Fat Cat Bar Grill mixes tasty bar food with live music and karaoke for a winning combination.

For those ready to show off their poker skills, Lake Tahoe boasts numerous casinos with a game for every player, whether you'd prefer blackjack or trying your odds at the slots. Look for concerts, comedy nights and dancing at Harvey's Tahoe, Bally's Lake Tahoe, and more.



Six Reasons to Visit ... Arizona



Discover why you should plan a trip to "The West's Most Western Town"

Encompassing almost 185 square miles of Greater Phoenix, Scottsdale is known for its golf courses, poolside resorts and booming cultural scene. Come fall and winter, when temperatures finally drop out of the triple digits — with daily highs in October just above 80 degrees Farenheit — the city comes into its own. The warm days are perfect for active pursuits among the saguaros and boulders, with cool nights ideal for sipping local wine by the fire pit. Read on to discover the charms of this Sonoran Desert playground.



It's sunny for more than 330 days each year

There's a reason why the Phoenix metropolitan area has been dubbed the "Valley of the Sun." The near-constant sunshine makes for excellent golf and tennis weather, though you shouldn't feel guilty if you'd rather spend your time lazing by the pool with a good book in hand. A thrilling way to cool off on the hottest of days is to head to the nearby Salt River, located about 30 miles east of town, where you can raft, tube, kayak, canoe, stand-up paddleboard or fish as birds of prey soar overhead. While exploring the area's stunning nature reserves, keep your eyes peeled for a sighting of the majestic Salt River wild horses, who roam free along the lower river banks.

It's home to the lushest desert in the world

Most people visit Scottsdale for the sunshine, but on the rare occasion you see rainfall, take solace in the fact that it's responsible for some dazzling natural beauty. Guinness World Records ranks Arizona's Sonoran Desert as the world's wettest, with up to 11.8 inches of annual rainfall, resulting in colorful wildflower blooms from February through April. One of the most awe-inspiring ways to take in the scenery is from a hot-air balloon, but if you'd rather keep your feet on the ground, visit the <u>Desert Botanical Garden</u> to admire an array of cacti, agaves and aloes. The botanical garden is home to nearly 1,000 giant saguaro cacti — an icon of the Southwest that only grows here in the Sonoran Desert.





Taliesin West is one of America's greatest buildings

America's most famous architect, Frank Lloyd Wright, began decamping to Scottsdale every winter in the mid-1930s. In 1937, he unveiled his iconic winter residence and desert design laboratory, Taliesin West. Built using Sonoran stone and sand, the house — all sweeping horizontal lines and warm tones — melts into the desert backdrop. The grounds are dotted with petroglyph-covered boulders, soaring cacti and even a fire-breathing dragon sculpture. In 2019, Taliesin West was one of eight Frank Lloyd Wright works to be jointly recognized as a UNESCO World Heritage site and visitors can even join a guided tour for exclusive access to the residence's private living spaces.

You can sip your way through the Scottsdale Wine Trail

Arizona is emerging as one of the most exciting wine-growing states in the country, with three American Viticultural Areas: the Verde Valley near Sedona, and Sonoita and Willcox near Tucson. But you don't need to leave Old Town Scottsdale to get a taste of the state's finest offerings. The Scottsdale Wine Trail features six wineries and tasting rooms, including the Aridus Wine Company and Merkin Vineyards, where you can sample pours alongside the chef's selection of local charcuterie or delicious pasta dishes. If you're more of a beer fan, don't worry — there's also the Scottsdale Ale Trail, which connects some of the 30-plus craft breweries in the greater Scottsdale area.



It boasts some of the country's top rock climbing

Scottsdale is blessed with numerous unique geological formations, from Camelback Mountain to Pinnacle Peak, which can be enjoyed by hikers and climbers alike. At the top of your list should be the 30,000-acre McDowell Sonoran Preserve, one of the largest urban parks in America. (The preserve, however, certainly doesn't look "urban" and earned this designation because it sits within city limits.) Among its most popular summits is Tom's Thumb, which can be reached by a boulder-strewn, 2.3-mile trail that ascends a calf-burning 1,200 feet — if you want a shortcut, you can always climb up the granite crag. For a less strenuous path with similar jaw-dropping views, try the Granite Mountain Loop.



It has an excellent collection of art galleries and museums

The city's downtown Arts District is home to the Smithsonian-affiliated Western Spirit: Scottsdale's Museum of the West, which celebrates the area and its transition from Old West to New West with cowboy paintings, Hopi pottery and historical artifacts such as explorer Meriwether Lewis' pipe tomahawk. Nearby, you can browse commercial galleries for some Western and Native American art. Also, don't miss the Scottsdale Museum of Contemporary Art, which hosts rotating exhibitions and a permanent James Turrell Skyspace installation called "Knight Rise" — imagine a serene courtyard with an elliptical ceiling aperture, through which you can take in the changing hues of the sky.



San Francisco

The Golden State has it all: stunning beaches, majestic mountains, dramatic deserts, vibrant cities and more. Indeed, there's so much for travelers to explore in California, making it the perfect destination for an action-packed road trip.

The Bay Area provides the ideal starting point for an unforgettable adventure that spans a little more than 600 miles, including a drive along the cliff-hugging Pacific Coast Highway, and eventually ending in San Diego. Within a week, you can take in many of the state's spectacular natural wonders, laid-back beach towns and storied cities — and still have enough time to visit wineries, galleries and cafes along the way.


Sample the city's exciting food scene

Tour San Francisco's vibrant neighborhoods via streetcar



First, spend a couple of days in San Francisco, one of the nation's most diverse metropolises. With its pedestrian-friendly neighborhoods and eclectic architecture – from striking Victorian houses to modern skyscrapers – this city by the bay is delightfully walkable. In just a few hours, you can enjoy a roving buffet: Grab a serving of creamy clam chowder at <u>Fisherman's Wharf</u>, sample some shrimp dumplings and barbecue pork buns in the largest <u>Chinatown</u> outside of Asia, and complete your feast with an authentic Italian cappuccino and a cannoli in North Beach.

If you get tired and need a break from climbing the city's spectacular hills, hop on one of its iconic cable cars, which were designated as a National Historic Landmark in 1964. Other must-dos include walking or biking across the renowned <u>Golden Gate Bridge</u>, and taking a ferry to <u>Alcatraz Island</u> for a tour of its infamous prison.



Santa Cruz

From San Francisco, it's less than a two-hour drive to Santa Cruz, but you'll feel like you're in a different world altogether in this surfing capital. Legend has it that back in 1885, three Hawaiian princes took to the waters off Santa Cruz on enormous surfboards made from local redwood, thereby introducing the sport to the mainland. Today, you can dive into that history by visiting the Santa Cruz Surfing Museum overlooking the beloved surfer beach Steamer Lane.

If you don't get to experience the thrill of riding the waves, another adrenaline rush awaits at the fun-filled <u>Santa Cruz Beach Boardwalk</u> in the form of the Giant Dipper, a wooden roller coaster with an approximately 65-foot drop. Afterward, calm your nerves with some relaxing forest bathing among the towering redwood and sequoia trees at <u>Big Basin Redwoods State Park</u>, about 20 miles north of the city.

Santa Cruz is a great place to begin your drive along the scenic California State Route 1, which is part of the extensive Pacific Coast Highway. You'll cross one of the most photographed bridges in California – the <u>Bixby Creek Bridge</u>, a single-span concrete arch that soars 260 feet above a steep canyon. Then, you'll enter <u>Pfeiffer Big Sur State Park</u>, where you'll be treated to breathtaking views of the sparkling Pacific Ocean.

Santa Barbara

Take your time traveling the winding U.S. Route 101 (approximately 260 miles) to Santa Barbara. This Central Coast city is where beachy casual meets glam, especially at The Funk Zone arts district. In this up-and-coming neighborhood, you'll discover many warehouses and other buildings that have been converted into upscale wine-tasting rooms, cafes, galleries and shops. Be sure to also explore Santa Barbara wine country. There are nine wine trails along country roads leading to various wineries and tasting rooms, where you can sample some of the best pinot noirs, chardonnays and syrahs in California.


Explore the city's charming waterside

Los Angeles

From here, it's about 100 miles to Los Angeles, the epicenter of the world's film and television industry. Soak in some Hollywood history by visiting the TCL Chinese Theatre and admire the 2,700-plus terrazzo and brass stars honoring cultural luminaries along the Hollywood Walk of Fame. Then, admire the giant Hollywood sign from Sunset Boulevard and learn more about the inner workings of film production by booking a studio tour at Paramount Pictures, Warner Bros. or Universal Studios Hollywood.

Soak up the California sunshine

For some of the best culinary experiences in the area, head west to the classic beach and dining hotspot of Santa Monica. You'll find plenty of options at the pedestrian esplanade 3rd Street Promenade, such as local bluefin tuna poke at Water Grill or a La Paloma cocktail (tequila blanco, grapefruit and lime juice, agave nectar and Squirt soda) at 1212 Santa Monica. Have time for a sunset bike ride? Rent a set of wheels and explore The Strand, a 22-mile coastal path passing through Venice Beach, Manhattan Beach, Hermosa Beach and Redondo Beach.

Carlsbad

If you prefer a quieter beach scene, you'll find it in San Diego County's best-kept secret. About 90 miles south of Los Angeles, Carlsbad is an idyllic seaside retreat with miles of pristine sands, incredible sunsets, innovative restaurants, top-notch golf courses and sprawling ranunculus flower fields that explode with color off Interstate 5 in the springtime. It's also home to LEGOLAND® California Resort, a theme park showcasing cities made out of millions of LEGO bricks. The resort also includes a water park and an aquarium. The latter is where you can get up close and personal with numerous marine creatures, including sharks and stingrays.

San Diego

Finally, round off your road trip in San Diego, nicknamed "America's Finest City" for its beautiful beaches and predominantly balmy weather. No visit is complete without seeing the world-famous San Diego Zoo in Balboa Park, but don't forget to also check out some of the area's lesser-known treasures, such as the La Jolla Sea Caves located 13 miles north of the city center. You can reach them through a kayak tour or by descending 145-odd steps on a self-guided tour beginning at The Cave Store.

Indeed, much of San Diego's identity is based on its proximity to the water, including its naval history - as highlighted at the USS Midway Museum - and seafood-heavy, Baja-inspired cuisine. Try the ceviche verde (green ceviche) at Puesto, a favorite among local foodies. Alternatively, indulge in comfort food - think chips and guacamole or an enormous steak and shrimp burrito - in the outdoor garden at Casa de Reyes in Old Town San Diego State Historic Park, Can't get enough of Mexican fare? You can still grab one last order of fish tacos at the San Diego International Airport after turning in your rental car.



And, if you're looking for the perfect vacation accommodations, you're in luck. While we wouldn't begrudge anyone wishing to spend their days lounging on the sand, Myrtle Beach's many attractions are certainly not to be missed. At Ripley's Aquarium of Myrtle Beach, visitors can glimpse a wide array of colorful sea creatures. Feeling brave? Explore the shark-filled Dangerous Reef in a glass-bottomed boat or visit the Touch Tank to get up close to horseshoe crabs and puffer fish.

Meanwhile, artistic types will want to check out the <u>Seacoast Artists</u>
<u>Gallery</u>. Situated in The <u>Market Common</u> lifestyle complex, the space

features original artworks by more than 70 local artists, spanning the mediums of photography, painting, pottery, sculpture and more. It also hosts classes and workshops for those seeking to hone their creative skills.

For a dose of nostalgia, swing by the Myrtle Beach Pinball Museum. It's home to dozens of pinball machines dating from the 1970s through to the present day, which you can even try your hand at a game during your visit.

Do

No trip to the Grand Strand is complete without strolling the Myrtle Beach Boardwalk. The 1.2-mile, palm-tree-dotted stretch offers charming shops, seafood eateries and carnival rides — and, not to mention, glorious vistas of the Atlantic Ocean. Once you've gotten your steps in, take a ride on the nearly 200-foot-tall SkyWheel Myrtle Beach for a bird's-eye view of the surroundings.

Nature lovers will want to dedicate a day to exploring <u>Huntington</u>.

Beach State Park, a 2,500-acre coastal preserve with freshwater lagoons, salt marshes, maritime forests and unspoiled beaches. Be sure to bring your binoculars: The park is widely considered one of the East Coast's top birding sites, with over 300 feathered species including herons, egrets, wood storks and bald eagles.

For more communing with nature, visit <u>Brookgreen Gardens</u>, dubbed one of the top public gardens in the United States by Tripadvisor. This vast green space is brimming with unique flora and fauna, including 250-year-old oak trees. It also features an impressive collection of American figurative sculptures, including works by Anna Hyatt Huntington, co-founder of the gardens.

Seeing marine creatures in an aquarium is great, but nothing compares to seeing them in their natural environment. You can do just that at Murrells Inlet, a fishing village where kayak tours take visitors through wildlife-rich salt marshes home to sea turtles, minks and even dolphins. Or, paddle the placid waters of the Waccamaw River, shaded by cypress trees draped in Spanish moss — look for ducks and otters along the way.

Eat



Don't miss the local seafood and barbecue at Myrtle Beach's best eateries

Myrtle Beach's culinary scene is as varied as it is delicious. Sure, the beach locale is renowned for its seafood, but there's also stellar barbecue, excellent Southern cuisine and hearty brunch fare to feast on.

Start your food tour at Murrells Inlet, which is known as the "Seafood Capital of South Carolina" for good reason. Russell's Seafood Grill is a long-standing establishment serving mouth-watering calamari and crab cakes, while Inlet Crab House and Raw Bar combines Southern flavors with Caribbean flair — order the steam pots, which come brimming with lobster tails, shrimp, clams, mussels and more.

For more Southern hospitality, make a reservation at the upscale Aspen Grille. The menu here features refined dishes such as Cabernetbraised short ribs, seared New Bedford scallops and truffle mushroom risotto, often served against a backdrop of live jazz music.

Brunch aficionados will delight in the sugary confections — think rainbow-hued macarons and French toast with bananas, rum sauce and whipped cream — at Croissants Bistro & Bakery, a favorite with locals and visitors alike. And for barbecue, there's only one stop in town you need to know: Little Pigs Bar-B-Q, a no-frills joint serving family recipes including hickory-smoked pork sandwiches.

Drink



Shaken, stirred or smoked — bring your wildest drink requests to <u>Bar 19 Twelve</u>, a creative cocktail bar in North Myrtle Beach. The trendy spot offers both indoor and outdoor seating, with a scenic terrace overlooking the Azalea Sands Golf Club. It's the perfect place to enjoy whimsical tipples paired with tasty small plates.

Big on beer? Head to <u>Grand Strand Brewing Company</u>, an industrial-style watering hole in downtown Myrtle Beach that has a dozen craft brews on tap. If you prefer your drinks with a side of ocean views, check out <u>Tin Roof</u>, a lively rooftop venue overlooking the boardwalk. Daily live music and happy-hour specials only add to the fun.

Things to do with the kids



Surfside Beach

Located 15 minutes from Myrtle Beach, this low-key beach town is beloved by families thanks to its tranquil waters, lifeguard supervision and fun-filled games (tennis, bocce, shuffleboard and more). In 2016, it proclaimed itself as an autismfriendly travel destination, adding to its family-oriented reputation.



Family Kingdom

As the name suggests, this old-school institution on South Ocean Boulevard — which first opened in 1966 — draws visitors of all ages. Among the theme park's 38-plus rides are a wooden roller coaster, a log flume, a figure-eight driving track and a slingshot that shoots adrenaline junkies 100 feet in the air.



WonderWorks

This self-described "amusement park for the mind" features more than 100 hands-on exhibits that combine education and entertainment. Visitors can experience 84 mph hurricane-force winds, climb into a replica of a NASA spacecraft and learn about optical illusions in the interactive art gallery.

48 hours in ... Park City, Utah

From world-class skiing to strolling Park City's historic Main Street, fall and winter are a magical time in this charming mountain retreat



Start your day by hitting the slopes bright and early. At Sunrise Lodge, a Hilton Grand Vacations Club, you'll enjoy direct access to the base of the Sunrise ski lift. Take advantage of the resort's on-site ski valet where gear can be rented and stored, then choose from over 300 trails, six natural halfpipes and seven terrain parks for a morning of world-class skiing and snowboarding. 11 A.M.

If you're here on the weekend, you can refuel with a hearty brunch at <u>Tupelo</u>, where chef Matthew Harris celebrates artisanal, locally sourced ingredients. The menu features unpretentious but sophisticated dishes, including barbecue pork tenderloin with cheddar grits, mustard greens and peach glaze, as well as roasted Idaho rainbow trout with hominy grits, farm greens and hotsauce butter. The buttermilk biscuits with honey butter are also a must.

1 P.M.

Just down the road, you'll find Kimball Art Center, Park City's creative hub since 1976. Catch the latest rotating exhibition in the center's striking temporary residence — a nearly 9,000-square-foot former warehouse with four beautiful, spacious galleries and 15-foot-high ceilings — while their new permanent home is being built. Wouldbe artists can try their hand at one of the many community classes on offer, including metalsmithing, tiedye workshops and painting.

3 P.M.

Head south for a stroll along Park City's vibrant Main Street, located in the heart of town. You can pick up a pair of cowboy boots or handmade jewelry at the area's independent boutiques, brush up on your mining and ski knowledge at the family-friendly Park City Museum and savor an afternoon cup of matcha, chai or Coconut Custard (a fragrant rooibos tea blend with creamy coconut) at Atticus Coffee, Books

5 P.M.

It's time to tuck into an early dinner before the night's entertainment. Handle, one of Park City's top tables, is just a stone's throw from Main Street. While wild game and juicy steaks are ubiquitous in this part of the country, this trendy spot serves creative, shareable small plates such as cauliflower with a sweet chili glaze, bucatini with mushroom bolognese and hamachi crudo with toasted breadcrumbs. They also shake up a stellar selection of playful cocktails.

7 P.M.

Stroll back into town and make your way
to the Egyptian Theatre for a live
performance at one of Park City's most
historic sites. Influenced by the discovery
of King Tut's tomb and with
construction supervised by an
Egyptologist, the theater opened in
1926. Today, it plays host to everything
from theatrical plays and musicals to
comedy shows and rock concerts.

Day two 8 A.M.

Get a healthy start at FiveSeeds, a popular venue known for its fabulous Australianstyle coffee, minimalist decor and fresh staples, including grain bowls and smoothies that help keep its patrons energized.

Properly caffeinated, it's time to explore Park City's extensive trail system by fat-tire bike, which allows cyclists to slide over rocks, snow and tough terrain no matter the season. Many outdoor outfitters provide bike rentals, while local companies run an array of guided tours.

11 A.M.

Pick up a picnic lunch from Chop Shop Park City —
a go-to place in town for delectable charcuterie
spreads — and climb aboard Heber Valley Railroad's
historic steam locomotive for a scenic 90-minute
ride that'll take you across the fields and farmlands
of Heber Valley and along the shores of Deer Creek
Reservoir. A variety of native wildlife including
mule deer, bald eagles, foxes and elk may make an
appearance during the trip, which will transport
you back to the Golden Years of the country's
railroading era when short-line railways were
common in Utah.

2 P.M.

Make the half-hour drive to Utah Olympic Park where the U.S. team made history during the 2002 Winter Games. Stop by the Eccles 2002 Olympic Winter Games Museum — part of the Alf Engen Ski Museum — to check out various interactive exhibits and watch the next generation of Olympic skiers and snowboarders training in the surrounding area. Then, experience the thrill as you hurtle down the official 2002 Olympic sliding track with a seasoned bobsled pilot.

6 P.M.

End your evening at High West Saloon, the Old Town counterpart of the award-winning High West Distillery. The restaurant, which features a menu of rustic comfort food — think bison carne asada tacos, parmesan-crusted pork schnitzel and fried chicken — operates on a first-come, first-served basis. If you need to pass some time, you can do so by sampling a flight of small-batch whiskeys at the bar.



4 P.M.


Just a few miles away, the adventure continues with a horse-drawn tour at Park City Sleigh Rides. The roughly 30-minute journey through Willow Draw comes complete with blankets to keep you warm and toasty as you dash through the snow.


